1. School updates.

Every teacher has a specialty skill set. School based Resource and ELL (English Language Learning) teacher **Gordon Thrift** and Learning Support Program teacher **James Scott** (on the






right doing a Churchill impersonation) bring over 55 years of combined teaching experience to our community. Like all our colleagues at Magee Mr. Thrift and Mr. Scott are absolutely passionate about supporting students with different learning abilities; both teachers have skills blocks as part of their load. Rather than restricting their skills classes to the

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
identified quarter in the current Covid hybrid system, both James and Gordon, together with Support Workers **Mrs. Susan Jolin** and **Mr. Patrick Milligen** (on the left, photo'd in the Skills Classroom) have devised an innovative system for Magee students to get additional support in the skills room both during designated skills blocks (if on your child's timetable) or at any time between 10:30 and 1:15.



James, Gordon, Susan and Patrick encourage not only students with Ministry Designations but any student who feels that they need additional support with an assignment, or if they need a quiet space to write a test, to connect with them and they will liaise with teachers and students to ensure your child is accommodated and supported as needed.

Eighteen months ago we started to discuss greater integration within the Science, Mathematics, and Shop classes as part of the changes occurring within the new BC Curriculum- the drive for more applications of learning in integrated settings. Our teachers visited local schools that are running STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) programs, did research on similar projects internationally, and had many meetings and debates

during Professional (ProD) days and during Collaboration and Flex times. Our Shop teacher, **Mr. Andy Robinson** (below, on the left, with Engineering students and Environmental Club members **Mr. Ethan Wong** and **Mr. Cole Berube**), and Science Department Head, **Mr. Colin Mayer** (on the right, advertising SFU), and members of our Environment Club embarked on a project to grow vegetables through hydroponic farming methods ... and not even Covid could stop them. During Andy's Engineering class



researched, designed, and built hydroponic gardening systems (left). This week the students planted our first seeds that will be transferred to the trays in 2 or 3



weeks' time. At that point, the environment club takes over and ensures correct temperature and water flow. And when the vegetables are grown **Mrs. Greer's** foods students will use the produce to make local, organic salads and dressing for I'm hoping

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burgers and hotdogs! This integration of learning allows students to work in extended design and implementation teams and apply theoretical concepts in real world contexts.

2. Student Covid connections.

The central reason why we returned to school when Covid numbers were actually on the increase was because we understand how important social connections are for adolescents, and we knew that we could build connections safely through the hybrid quarter system. Wherever possible and when safe and within the Covid distancing guidelines our teachers are engineering learning moments that facilitate social connection between students, and with our counsellors we are constantly looking out for students who appear disconnected or lonely.

However, it is not just our teachers who are mindful of the student's experience.

Three weeks ago the teacher sponsor for our student council, Mr. Thomas Nute asked me into his weekly council meeting where I listened to students brainstorming ways to increase student connections during Covid. As you will get when you give teenagers the freedom and space to imagine, several innovative suggestions were made but wherever possible we also want to maintain traditional activities ... which includes Haloweek without the annual parade of Monsters, demons and witches. One of the activities we could safely have was the annual Pumpkin Pie eating contest.



In a non-Covid year **Club's Day** is held over a lunch in

the foyer. To reduce clustering and prevent transmission Student Council arranged Club's Week (2nd to 6th November). 4. Swing site update.

Construction on the new Maple Grove Elementary is almost complete, and classes in their new building will begin on **Monday, November 23, 2020**.



As decided in 2019, the (old) Maple Grove building will become a VSB seismic program swing site and Edith Cavell Elementary was earmarked to utilize this space. To this end, Edith Cavell Elementary students will move into the existing Maple Grove school with a teaching start date currently scheduled for **Monday, January 4, 2021**.

District staff, school administrators, and school staff will be working together in the coming weeks to minimize disruption to student learning during these moves, and to enhance our teacher colleagues' ability to deliver excellent learning programs. Where appropriate, this coordinated planning could include field use, emergency drills and transportation plans. All Health and Safety protocols and procedures (both Covid related and more generally) will be in place in all school buildings on the Magee/Maple Grove/Edith Cavell site.
