

School administration have asked our VPD school liaison officer, Constable Ben Wong-Moon to increase monitoring at the intersection of Maple and 37th. A singular benefit of the VPD school liaison officer program is that we develop a professional relationship with a single officer who gains a deep knowledge of our school's geography and personality, our student's and staff. In this case, Vice Principal Kelly Egilsson requested Constable Wong-Moon to increase monitoring of the traffic flow around the school, and traffic congestion at the Maple/37th intersection- which Ben has done this week. Please: no texting, phoning or drop off in-front of the school at Maple/37th. Str intersection- the area is designated no stopping for student safety reasons: pedestrians (students) crossing at the intersections need sightlines up and down Maple street and across down 37th; similarly other drivers need the open sightlines to see pedestrians and avoid a student who might not check for traffic while running home to start homework!!

In the cycle of a school's year, student course selection leads to timetabling which leads to Administration offering contracts to our teacher colleagues. So, when in January and February students **request to change courses** run-on impacts on staffing loads, class composition and class size occur, impacts which affect students across a grade. To prevent these disruptions we do not explore requests for course changes- except in the most exceptional of circumstances (for example, requests supported by a pediatrician or mental health professional). Student course selection (which drives the timetable) then becomes really important- more on this on page four!





Collages in this Magee News come from our **Law 12** students. Part of their remote learning activity was to identify and research aspects of Crimes against Humanity and/or Genocide as two aspects of International Human Rights law. In addition to in-class presentations that are occurring during their contact block students were also asked to develop a representational collage, and write a comprehensive essay detailing their chosen Crime against Humanity or Genocide. **Mr. Brownrigg** was kind enough to share examples of the student's work. **Leah Lea, grade 11**, researched Korea's 'Comfort women' and their role during the Japanese occupation of Korea during the second world war. On the right of Lea's collage, she explained, on the walls of the brothel where the soldier waits, are the names of 'comfort' women- black names are women who have passed; green names are women who are still alive. On the left, images representing the violence of occupation. Caught between both forms of violence and destruction violence, a sightless crying woman.

UBC Engineers Without Borders student competition

This year's Engineers Without Borders Youth Venture **Covid-19 Case Competition** is fast approaching, sponsored by BC Children's Hospital Research Institute. Student sign up applications are still open- sign up here: https://forms.gle/d1pnicEggJj6wwvm7

The case competition is run over 2 days, January 30th and 31st. **Saturday January 30th** will be a panel discussion where 5 professionals from different backgrounds speak and answer questions. At the end of the day, the design topic will be released, and the student teams will have the rest of the evening to think about possible designs. On **Sunday January 31st**, there will be 5 informative videos released throughout the day describing the different stages of the engineering design cycle to help guide students through the design process. After viewing the video, students will be given time to work on that stage of the process and complete the associated deliverable. The deliverables created will ultimately be compiled and used for the final design pitch.

This design pitch will be judged by a panel of professional engineers as well as medical professionals. All participants will receive a certificate for their participation in this competition and the winning teams will receive their prizes via mail. For more information head to this link.
