February 12, 2021 marks the beginning of this year's Lunar New Year celebrations for the Year of the Ox. The term Lunar New Year refers to the first day of the New Year that is associated with the cycles of the moon.

#### What is the Chinese Lunar Calendar?

The Chinese Calendar is a lunisolar calendar. It integrates the revolution of the Earth around the Sun and the movement of the Moon around the Earth. A month begins at the day of the new moon or invisible Moon and ends at the day before the next new moon. The full moon is either on the 15th or 16th of the month. A Chinese year can have 12 or 13 lunar months.

Lunar New Year is traditionally celebrated in China, Taiwan, Hong Kong, Macau, Singapore, Indonesia, Malaysia, Korea, Thailand, Vietnam, Cambodia, Mauritius and the Philippines. It is also celebrated in Australia, Canada and anywhere people from these Asian countries now call home.

Traditions, customs and ways of celebrating this holiday vary depending on where families live and have lived. Often, families gather on New Year's Eve for a large family meal. It is also traditional for every family to thoroughly clean the house, in order to sweep away any ill-fortune and to make way for incoming good luck. Windows and doors are decorated with red colour paper-cut and couplets with popular themes of: good fortune, happiness, wealth and longevity. Other activities include lighting firecrackers and giving money in red paper envelopes.

As a District, we have an intentional focus on equity within our work. As a District we are committed to:


- Creating a culture of care and shared social responsibility.

- Explicitly addressing racism and teaching about anti-racism.

At Henderson we work to ensure all staff and students feel safe, valued and included. As a school community we strive to not only embrace and celebrate our diversity, but work towards equity.

Like many of you, the topic of racism and discrimination is a part of my story. We are fortunate in our community to have a diverse staff, so that our students can see themselves reflected in 'their role models'. It is not a perfect system, but we are ahead of many other communities. My journey in education has been about making sure all people and stories are represented within our schools. I too am trying to process what will be my role as we move forward, helping give voice to the unheard and helping our community understand what is happening and what we can do to build a stronger society where we all feel we have and do have the same opportunities to succeed.

Thank you for all you do and will continue to do to support and nurture our children to value all human life. We will need to continue to work together to uplift each other, to obtain true equality and heal as a society.

I have been inspired by the conversations that have been happening within our school and the thoughtful ideas and stories shared by our students. Hearing our children gives me great hope for a brighter future.



### **TALKING TO OUR CHILDREN – becoming ANTI-RACIST**

As we look to instill the skills of critical thinking, empathy and compassion in our children, we want to be able to talk to them about topics that might be difficult for us or complex to say the least. Right now, all around us we are witnessing events that are pushing discussions of racial inequality to the forefront. It is important that our discussions include first-hand accounts and stories from Black, Indigenous, and people of colour. We need to read these books by diverse authors from their perspectives to deepen our understanding and empathy for their experiences and histories. We want to make sure that we are not unintentionally perpetuating stereotypes and tokenism. Part of our discussion should also include questions about how we see people of colour portrayed in the media.

Equally important, at this time, in our discussions is to acknowledge that we all have our own biases, based on our own histories. Students need to know about their own family histories. We need to be able to discuss the contributions and challenges of not only the cultural groups we identify with, but also those that make up our community.

And lastly, we want to equip our students with the skills to be agents of change. If we truly value equality for all, we need to teach our children to be active and not bystanders when they see injustices around them. Of course, these discussions are always conducted in age-appropriate ways, and go deeper as our students grow older. But we also know these discussions need to start early.

All of these steps will help us build our skills to work towards becoming antiracist.



## **Inquiry Based Learning**



What is Inquiry Based Learning? Inquiry based learning is a learning and teaching approach that emphasizes students' questions, ideas and observations. Teachers actively encourage students to share their thoughts and to respectfully challenge, test and redefine ideas. At Henderson, we as a staff are lucky to have started to work with master teacher Trevor MacKenzie to dig deeper into our learning on Inquiry.

This year our school inquiry question is: What educational practices and strategies might we implement to increase student engagement, student choice and student voice? Also we will continue to work on the district focus on Indigenous Education. Our inquiry goal in this area is: How can we make First Peoples teaching and learning

**more authentic? How best can we Indigenize Henderson School?** All of our classes will be working hard on these goals in addition to all of the other areas of the curriculum and core competencies.

## **COVID Protocols Reminders**

## Kindergarten Registration is Open

Children attend Kindergarten in the same year that they turn five years old.

The first step for everyone is to register with your neighbourhood <u>English catchment school</u>-regardless of whether you plan to send your child there.

### Key Dates

- November 1 to the last weekday of January is the deadline for priority enrolment for children attending Kindergarten for the following September.
  - <u>Note:</u> Sibling Priority for Kindergarten admission is only provided to students who register between November 1 - January 31. Sibling priority is not provided after January 31.
- January 11 to February 3 is the Choice Application process.
- February 1 February 28 is the period for Cross Boundary Application.



### **Registration Process**

If your child was born in Canada, complete the online form, before bringing in your supporting documents.

**Step 2: Verifying Documentation** 

Visit your catchment school with necessary documents

•Contact your English Catchment School Office to set up an appointment to bring your supporting documentation

Bring supporting documentation to your English catchment school office during your scheduled appointment

The following original documents must be presented at your catchment school to complete your application:

- Proof of British Columbia residency
- The original birth certificate of the child
- Applicable Immigration/Citizenship/Permanent Resident Documentation
- Immunization Records if available

[Note: Some schools may request additional identification as proof of residency.]

If your child was born outside of Canada, you will need to go to the VSB District - Newcomer Welcome Centre and complete the initial registration there.

**NOTE:** Some English catchment schools do not have space for all catchment students even if you apply before the January 31 deadline. In these cases, there will be a draw for student placement in the first several months of the New Year and the school will contact you.
