







# 1<sup>st</sup> Place in the Annual CANADIAN MINECRAFT CHALLENGE!



### THE VALUE OF PLAY FOR YOUNG LEARNERS

"Children need the freedom and time to play. Play is not a luxury. Play is a necessity."– Kay Redfield Jamison

Children learn to interact in the world around them through explorative play. Through play children develop their creativity, imagination, dexterity, coordination, curiosity, and problem-solving skills. Play

is important to a child's development of physical, cognitive, and social emotional learning skills.

You might wonder how this is possible. Think about watching your child soon after they learned to move. Remember when everything they came across, they used their five senses to make sense of them: seeing (curious of everything they come across), touching (grabbing, shaking, manipulating), tasting (everything went into their mouth), smelling (maybe things went under or into the nose), listening (if it made noise, they continued to make it). Maria Montessori believed, "*The hands are the instrument of a man's intelligence.*" And as young children struggle to create a desired effect with a toy, they discover that it isn't always easy. They realize that there is perhaps a problem to be solved and that they must practice acquiring and improve the skills necessary to achieve their goal.

Play becomes a social enterprise once you add another child.
